## Small (under 20 feet at maturity)\*\*

## Unsuitable species for boulevards

These species are not permitted for boulevard planting because they can become very large with shallow root system prone to wind toppling, are weak-wooded and prone to storm damage, have large and shallow roots that can heave sidewalks, are invasive, or have other undesirable characteristics.

- All conifers, including spruce, pine, fir, juniper.
- All cottonwoods, aspens and others in poplar family, including hybrids.
- All willows, including hybrids.
- Box elder. Cultivar 'Sensation' may be considered for trial by City Arborist.
- Silver maples.
- Siberian elm.
- Russian olive.
