## October 27, 2021

The Parks & trails Committee met over Zoom video conferencing.

## 1) Roll Call

2) Agenda Review – Clay will present the No Mow May update at a future meeting.

## 3) Approval of Minutes

• Minutes from September meeting minutes: Sarah Stands motioned to approve, Connor seconded, unanimously approved

## 4) New Business

• Status of Bitterroot Trail

Jeanne noted public comments and questions about damage to Bitterroot trail by developer and City response; Sarah will draft a social media post to share about trail closure and send to Jeanne for approval.

## 5) Old Business

- Recommendation to City Commission on Reservoir Park
  - Alison described the expressed public priorities, concerns about traffic safety, triangle space and other items noted in the document.
  - Hayes Goosey provided comments including supportive of native space and native gardens, pollinator species, kids play area; still doesn't like dog park idea.
  - Alison motioned to make a multi-year recommendation to develop Reservoir Park along the lines of the feedback that was collected from the public (with details about priorities, amenities, concerns, etc.), Connor seconded.
  - Committee discussed drafting the proposal and communicating with city staff to
    ensure we're following the right process and then PTC holding a subsequent
    special meeting to review and approve the final recommendations in November.
    Dorel contacted the City Manager, who suggested a straightforward
    recommendation, i.e., 'here's what we would like to see in developing Reservoir
    Park....' Rachael suggested something short. Jeanne suggested modifying the
    recommendation to the City Commission to simply direct the city to develop the
    park with consideration for the feedback and priorities shared in our summary

document, over a multi-year period, with special attention paid to areas of concern as raised by the public.

- Rachel offered a substitute motion based on Jeanne's suggestion, accepted by Alison and Connor, Sarah seconded, unanimously approved.

# **PROJECT BRIEFING:**

Inaugural "No Mow May" Provides Important Step Toward Positioning Livingston as a Leader in Pollinator Conservation

Prepared by the Livingston Parks and Trails Committee for the City of Livingston

**On May 1, 2021**, the Livingston Parks and Trails Committee (PTC), with the support of the City of Livingston, launched a new No Mow May (NMM) initiative to support Livingston's pollinator species—particularly spring bees and butterflies—with much-needed food in the form of dandelions and other naturally occurring wildflowers on public and private grounds. This relatively simple undertaking is helping to position Livingston as a leader in native bee conservation in the state of Montana. Livingston is the first city in Montana to designate a NMM initiative.

In 2017, Montana State University estimated that Montana is home to the greatest number of bumble bee species in the nation, and many of these are threatened, including the western bumble bee, a once-common species, which is found throughout the town of Livingston," Bumble bees are some of the most important pollinators in Montana, pollinating a broad range of crops, local gardens, and native plants. Unfortunately, one out of every four species of North American bumble bee is at risk of extinction.

No Mow May test plots were located in Mars Park, Mike Webb Park field area, Mayors Landing and the former roping arena area, the Livingston-Park County Library, and along the Hwy 89 S bike path. Flyers were also passed out to local business. A limited number of yard signs were also available for residents who were interested in participating by not mowing their yards in May. The PTC hopes to continue this program in subsequent years.

## **OUTCOMES & NEXT STEPS:**

A total of 48 16"x 12" No Mow May (NMM) yard signs and two large NMM banners were printed with the support of the City of Livingston. This signage was printed with generous support by the City of Livingston, which donated \$500.00 to cover the expense. Both banners, and approximately 15 signs, were distributed in designated public areas throughout the City of Livingston. The remainder of the yard signs were utilized by community members who wanted to participate in their own yards.

The NMM initiative, which seems to have been favorably received by the Livingston community, was a topic of conversation among community members on social media, in local business such as coffee shops, and other gathering places. The initiative was featured in an article in the Livingston Enterprise, and by the International League of Conservation Photographers, a Washington D.C. based non-profit organization.

Initial plans included a field day for community participants, but due to inclimate weather, a sudden cold snap after blooms had opened, followed by warm temperatures, local bee populations were slower than usual to emerge this year. Due to these events, a decision was made to cancel the event for the 2021 field season.

The Livingston Parks and Trails Committee would like to encourage the City of Livingston to designate NMM an annual tradition. It is good for our local pollinators, saves the city on early spring park maintenance fees, and it offers a cost-effective way for community members to get involved with citizen science and pollinator conservation. It also saves the city money on groundskeeping fees in designated parks.
