### PERSONNEL RELATED

### **Department Staffing**

The police department's budgeted staffing consists of 14 full-time sworn officers and 1 part-time parking enforcement officer. The structure consists of the chief, assistant chief, 3 sergeants, 6 patrol officers, two full time detectives, one school resource officer (SRO) and a parking enforcement officer. Staffing levels remain consistent from the previous year.

Officer Randy Schott completed one year probationary period of employment and was appointed to permanent status.


One officer was terminated in late 2012, and no new hires were added.

### CITIZEN CALLS FOR SERVICE

The department received 6458 calls for service, 123 more than in 2011. Calls for service represent all calls received by the communications center that fall within our jurisdiction, including fire/EMS and animal related calls. Although officers may not respond to or handle all such calls, they do respond to many. Therefore all calls for service are included.

Calls for law enforcement and emergency service rose steadily beginning in the 1990's, increasing over 100% from the year 1990 (3414 calls) until peaking out in 2007 when 7385 calls were received. (Refer to Figure 1) The increase in the calls for service in the 1990's seemed to have reflected a period of growth and change in Livingston, following the closure of the BN Railroad shops in the mid 1980's. Annexation spurred new residential and commercial developments, the regional mining industry flourished and other factors attributed to significant social and economic vigor. Based on the past few years, it appears that the number of calls for service has essentially stabilized. There are no indicators that calls for service will increase or decrease dramatically over the next few years, but such a prediction is contingent upon many unknown factors.

### **Types of Calls Received**


Over 75% of calls for service are non criminal related (Refer to Figure 2). Dealing with the wide variety of situations outside the realm of criminal law is time consuming, but a necessary public service. Often faced with limited manpower, officers must prioritize their time and give attention to the most critical tasks while attempting to resolve lower priority calls. Imminent or anticipated threats to public safety will take precedence over property crimes or non criminal related complaints that pose no risk to any person.

Criminal complaints include calls that do or could involve a violation of criminal law, and may result in arrest or a criminal investigation. Patrol officers are usually the first to respond and deal with immediate concerns. Investigation of serious crimes or those that will likely be time intensive are normally referred to a detective for follow-up investigation, allowing patrol officers to be available to respond to other calls.

Traffic complaints shown include officer generated arrests and formal enforcement action, but do not include traffic or parking citations issued that do not result in an arrest or formal investigation. Most are citizen complaints regarding traffic violations, parking problems, or abandoned/junk vehicles.

Animal related calls include domestic animal complaints, as well as wild animals and the increasing number of deer being hit by vehicles. Patrol officers respond to a variety of animal complaints, many of which are referred to the Animal Control Officer for follow-up. Per department policy, officers do not impound and transport dogs unless the Animal Control Officer is not available and the dog is vicious and there is an immediate need to impound the animal. Once a dog has been taken into possession, the officer is unable to transport an arrestee and is obligated to care for the dog until being released to the animal shelter or owner. After hours, this may take a great deal of time.

### POLICE ACTIVITY

#### **Patrol Officer Workload**

Although patrol officers handle the vast majority of calls, for statistical purposes the annual average number of calls shown (Refer to Figure 3) is based on the number of sworn officers budgeted during the designated time periods, including the police chief, assistant chief, school resource officer and detective positions. There are times of staffing shortage due to vacation, sick leave, injury, training, and vacancies created by resignation, retirement or termination. In reality, the number of calls per patrol officer is actually much greater than shown.


In the 1980's, based on full staffing of 10 sworn officers as of 1989, officers averaged 317 calls per year. Despite adding 2 sworn positions in the 1990's, this average rose when the number of calls escalated rapidly during this time period. A new position was added in the fall of 2001 when the City entered into an agreement with the school district and a private citizen to fund a School Resource Officer position. Although the SRO was assigned to the schools during the school year, the position was available for patrol during the summer months to assist with the added workload. Despite this added position, the workload continued to grow.

The average number of calls per officer from 2000-2009 reflect a 70% increase from the 1980's and a 20% increase from the 1990's. A 14<sup>th</sup> sworn position was added in 2009, which attributed to a decline in the average numbers of calls per officer in subsequent years.

The 2012 calls for service per officer is fairly consistent with the 1990's, but still considerably higher than the 1980's and prior.

As the number of calls per officer increases, less time is available for routine patrol duties and traffic enforcement. Each call for service can be time consuming, some more so than others, considering response time and any follow-up work that needs to be done. Calls that require an investigation or that lead to an arrest require written reports to be generated and data entered into the computerized records management system, in addition to time dedicated to the investigation or activity related to the call. Increased workload also requires officers to prioritize calls and assess how much time to dedicate to minor issues or routine patrol activities.

Regardless of the number of calls for service officers must respond to, it is important to recognize that much of the time there are only 2 patrol officers on duty and there are times when only 1 is on duty. Most calls are non-threatening in nature. However, on duty officers are expected to immediately respond to whatever situation occurs, frequently dealing with hostile situations and dangerous persons alone or with inadequate assistance. Typical of smaller jurisdictions, our officers do not always benefit from relying on multiple officers to assist with a dangerous situation.


### **Investigations and Arrests**

Officers generated 992 written incident reports, an increase from 912 the previous year. Incident Reports are calls for service that result in an arrest, criminal investigation or other police action requiring written investigative reports. Prior to 2000, Annual Reports only listed calls for service. Incident Reports were not documented separately until 2000 when the current computer software system was implemented in compliance with the FBI National Incident Based Reporting System.

452 custodial adult arrests were effected for various criminal offenses, up from 404 the previous year. Juvenile arrests (Youth Probation Referrals) numbered 112, compared to 82 the previous year. Despite the significant increase in the number of juvenile arrests in 2012, the number is considerably lower than the long term average.

The 1980-1989 arrest numbers above include both adults and juveniles.

Prior to 2000 each criminal charge, or each warrant served, counted as an arrest. (an individual could be arrested on 3 warrants, or charged with 3 offenses, and it counted as 3 arrests.) Arrests numbers after 2000 reflect each separate time an individual was arrested, regardless of how many offenses he/she was charged with.

56 DUI related arrests were made, a decline from 65 arrests in 2011.

Officers responded to 65 domestic disturbance incidents, essentially equal to 66 reports in 2011. However, the number of arrests (46) increased 31%. The decision to arrest on a partner/family member assault incident is based on criteria set forth in department policy and as guided by state law.

Citations issued for drug related offenses nearly doubled in 2012. Aggressive enforcement and proactive interdiction efforts were successful in this effort. The afternoon shift detective focuses heavily on unlawful drug activity as well as other criminal activity.

Sex offense investigations were up significantly in 2012, with 22 investigations conducted compared to 15 the previous year.

Of the unattended human deaths that were investigated, 1 was concluded to have been the result of suicide. This number is far fewer than average. There were no homicides reported.

### **Major Crimes**

Although the department investigated a considerable number of serious crimes, major cases that have significant public impact were few. Two armed robberies were reported and investigated in 2012, one at a local motel and the other at a casino. One remains unsolved and the other is under investigation with a suspect having been identified.

### Calls Received by Time of Day

The peak times for calls were between 10:00 am and 8:00 pm, with the least activity between 3: 00 am and 7:00 am (Refer to Figure 5). This pattern corresponds with the times of highest activity among citizens and is not surprising. However, calls received during the daytime hours are generally minor in nature (traffic complaints, animal complaints, parking problems, etc.) and the least time consuming on a per call basis.

Most custodial arrests are effected during the evening and nighttime hours, and calls during these times are generally more severe and time consuming. Patrol shifts are structured in an attempt to provide adequate coverage during times of high call volume and high severity.

#### **Use of Force Incidents**

Many force and equipment options are available to officers. They must choose an appropriate option based on the threat, either actual or perceived, including but not limited to: officer presence, verbal direction, physical control, chemical or inflammatory agents, impact weapons, Tasers (Electronic control devices), firearms, vehicles, and/or weapons of necessity or opportunity.

It is the policy of the Livingston Police Department that officers use the amount of force which is objectively reasonable to make an arrest, gain control of a situation, or to protect the officer or another from harm, given the facts and circumstances perceived by the officer at the time force is applied.

A separate written Use of Force Report is completed and documented, in addition to an incident report, in any of the following use of force incidents:

- Discharge of a firearm, accidentally or intentional, at or toward any person
- Striking of a subject with an impact weapon, or other weapon of necessity or opportunity.
- Discharge of a Taser.
- Use of force that results in injury to the subject, or complaints of injury.
- Use of physical or weaponless force against an individual to the extent it is likely to cause or lead to unforeseen injury, claim of injury or allegations of excessive force.
- Use of empty hand stunning or striking techniques.
- Discharge of a chemical weapons.
- Use of a vehicle as an offensive weapon.
- The use of a canine to apprehend a subject, resulting in a bite.
- The pointing of a weapon at any person, or drawing a weapon accompanied by verbal threats to use the weapon. This does not apply to the drawing of weapons in appropriate situations where officers do not point the weapon at any person or threaten to use the weapon.
- The use of leg restraints.

Separate Use of Force Reports are not required for weaponless hand to hand control techniques that have little or no chance of producing injuries when gaining control over or subduing non-compliant or resisting persons. These techniques include, but are not limited to, physical touching, escort holds, gripping or holding, frisking, or handcuffing.





#### PROPERTY CRIMES REPORTED

The number of theft and vandalism reports increased slightly in 2012, but burglary reports were down. Overall, reported incidents of theft, vandalism and burglary remain lower than the long term average and continue a positive trend in this direction.





There were 10 vehicles confirmed stolen from our jurisdiction in 2012 (not including unauthorized use), compared to 6 in 2011, 7 in 2010, 5 in 2009, 11 in 2008, 19 in 2007, 12 in 2006 and 15 in 2005.

### VEHICLE ACCIDENTS & TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

The number of citations issued for traffic related offenses increased by 5% from the previous year.


Officers completed 152 vehicle accident reports, the lowest number in recorded history. Even though the City has assumed jurisdiction of more roads through annexation in recent years, the accident rate remained relatively static until 2009 when we have since experienced a significant reduction.

Based on local data, there is no correlation between the number of traffic citations issued and the number of vehicle accidents (Refer to Figure 7). Despite the number of traffic citations issued from

2000–2012 being less than 50% of the number issued from 1980- 1999, the accident rate remained stable and has declined considerably over the past 4 years.


Vehicle Accident / Traffic Citation Ratio, 1980 – 2012 Trends



Traffic enforcement remains an essential part of the police function, but has become a lesser priority than during earlier years. As the number of calls for service has increased, officers have less time for dedicated traffic enforcement (Refer to Figure 8). Aggressive traffic enforcement activity requires adequate staffing and free patrol time, or otherwise be given a higher priority over other duties. Patrol officers attempt to routinely enforce traffic laws as workload permits, focusing on areas of greatest concern in regards to public safety. The heaviest traveled streets have the most accidents, therefore are subject to increased traffic enforcement than less traveled streets with few or no accidents.


Calls for Service / Traffic Citations Issued Correlation



Over 62% of all reported accidents occurred on 8 streets (Refer to Figure 9). These streets are generally regulated by traffic control devices (stop signs and traffic lights). As could be expected, the heaviest traveled streets were prone to having the most accidents. Park Street, for instance, accounted for 31 accidents, or 20% of the total.


Highest Rated Accident Streets (Streets with 5% or more of all accidents), 2012



Although accidents were distributed throughout the jurisdiction, most occurred in the central portion of the city where traffic is greatest. 49% of accidents that occurred on public streets were non intersection related, while 29% occurred within intersections. Inattentive driving remains a primary cause of most vehicle accidents.

Some specific areas were the location of multiple accidents, with.3 or more accidents occurring at the following locations.

- 5<sup>th</sup> and Park 4 accidents
- 100 Block West Lewis 4 accidents
- C and Chinook 3 accidents
- B and Park 3 accidents
- 100 Block West Park 3 accidents
- 100 Block South 3<sup>rd</sup> 3 accidents


No fatalities were reported in 2012.

### RACIAL PROFILING AND TRAFFIC STOP DATA

Pursuant to the requirements of 44-2-117 MCA, department policy requires the collection of data for each traffic stop that determines whether any officer has a pattern of stopping members of minority groups for violations of vehicle laws in a number disproportionate to the population of minority groups residing or traveling within our jurisdiction.

Officers are required to document the race or ethnicity of the driver and record the information into our records management system to be used to compile racial profiling data. The determination is based on their perception of the person's race. Figure 11 below shows the number of drivers, by race, that were stopped in 2012.

Distribution of Traffic Stops by Race, 2012




Consistent with the requirements of law, department policy provides for an annual review of this data. If the review reveals a pattern of any officer(s) of the Livingston Police Department stopping members of minority groups for violations of vehicle laws in a number disproportionate to the population of minority groups residing or traveling within our jurisdiction, an investigation must be conducted to determine whether the officer(s) routinely stop members of said minority groups for violations of vehicle laws as a pretext for investigating other violations of criminal law. The required review is incorporated into the Livingston Police Department Annual Report of Statistics, and this shall be considered the required review.

Detailed statistical information is included with this 2012 annual report, which includes information compiled from each traffic stop. One page contains racial profiling statistics from the entire department. There are also statistics from each individual officer who was employed during 2012. Upon review of these statistics, and having received no complaints alleging racial profiling from any person in 2012, there is no reason to conclude that officer(s) routinely stop members of minority groups for violations of vehicle laws as a pretext for investigating other violations of criminal law.

Figure 12 below shows the disposition of all traffic stops that were made, regardless of race. The decision to issue a warning or citation rests with the officer, based on the nature of the violation, the overall circumstances and other factors to be considered.

### OTHER DUTIES AND ASSIGNMENTS

### **Bicycle Patrol**

Several specially trained officers continued to conduct bicycle patrols throughout the City at various times of the day and night, depending on workload and the availability of enough officers to provide vehicle patrol. Bicycle patrols are very effective in proactive patrol, being stealthy and versatile. Officers can cover much more area than foot patrols, and are less visible to potential offenders than marked patrol vehicles. Bicycle patrols are also more approachable to citizens, affording enhanced interaction with the public.

### **Parking Enforcement**

Our part time parking enforcement officer issued 929 parking citations in the downtown district. The parking enforcement officer continues to maintain some of the responsibilities of managing the parking ticket computerized database and other clerical functions, allowing the City finance department to operate with minimal staffing. Although this has accommodated a reduction in workforce, the parking enforcement officer completes less enforcement rounds in the downtown district than in earlier years.

### Missouri River Drug Task Force

The City of Livingston Police Department continued to be a member of the Missouri River Drug Task Force, a multi-jurisdictional effort funded by a federal grant with partial contributions from participating agencies. Pursuant to the agreement, the City of Livingston and Park County equally fund a portion of the costs necessary to provide one full time Park County deputy who works with the task force as a full time investigator. Our officers, especially the afternoon shift detective, work closely with this investigator, sharing drug related intelligence and forwarding cases for follow up investigation by the task force. These joint efforts have been successful in prosecuting drug offenders in Livingston and Park County.

#### **Canine Unit**

The department maintains one canine unit, consisting of a specially trained and certified dog/handler team, which was placed into service in 2010. The canine is certified in narcotics detection, article search, tracking, building search, area search, officer protection and aggression control.

### **SUMMARY**

Overall, there was an increase in department workload from the previous year. There was also an increase in officer generated activity such as arrests and citations. Despite this increase, crime trends in recent years are very favorable to the citizens of our community. The number of reported burglaries in 2012 was the lowest number in decades. Theft and vandalism reports also remain below the long term average. Investigating and preventing crimes against persons and property, and responding to public safety threats, remain the top priority. The police department will continue to focus on potential threats, aggressively respond to indications of criminal behavior and swiftly react to crimes that occur.

The department maintains an aggressive sexual and violent offender registration and compliance program. The detective's office monitors each offender quite closely to ensure that they remain compliant, and attempts to identify and initiate prosecution of offenders who are non compliant. Offender information is disseminated to the public to the extent allowable by law. Offender information is displayed on the public awareness bulletin board in the hall of the law enforcement wing of the City County Building, as well as applicable notifications in the local newspaper when a new offender registers.

Budgetary constraints and equipment needs remain a primary concern. Effective law enforcement operations require appropriate staffing levels, proper training, and adequate equipment. Acquiring and maintaining sophisticated technology, such as computer software and hardware, digital and audio recording devices, in-car video cameras, weapons, etc. not only increases efficiency but is absolutely necessary to comply with public expectations and function in our modern society. Proper equipment is critical for officers to efficiency, effectively and safely perform their duties. Failure to provide adequate equipment and tools will result in substandard service, reduced efforts to combat crime, increased liability and put officers and the public at risk.

To this end, the police department, 911 center and Park County Sheriff's office is acquiring a new joint computer records management software system, CAD system and will be implementing the use of mobile data terminals (MDT's). The new software will greatly enhance records management, replacing the old system that has become obsolete and inefficient. The use of MDT's will allow patrol officers to spend more time in the field, allow instant access to a wider range of information and increase efficiency. With officers and deputies able to retrieve information and enter data in the field, it should reduce the workload for 911 communications staff.

Our strongest component continues to be the men and women of this department who diligently perform the day to day tasks they are assigned to perform. They are well trained and have proven themselves prepared to do their jobs well. Each and every member of this department is dedicated to the needs of our community and stand ready to protect and serve. Department structure is adapted to best be able to address community needs and departmental goals, focusing on responding to calls for service, investigating crimes, and identifying and apprehending criminal offenders. On behalf of all members of the department, we look forward to proudly serving the citizens of Livingston in 2013 and beyond.

Adult arrests prior to 2004 reflect all custodial arrests, and include the number of individual warrants served and charges filed (ie. if an individual was arrested on 3 warrants, or was charged with 3 different offenses, it was counted as 3 separate arrests.) In 2004 the statistics were changed to reflect the actual number of arrests made, regardles of how many offenses the offender was charged with. An arrest now represents each time an individual is booked or cited for a criminal offense.


